Just something for us to be aware of. Redwood Industries out of Reno is trying to get the FAA to approve 10 acres of the runway for lithium battery storage, and there is a huge... a bunch of potential hazards with that that could potentially affect Round Mountain, but they're going to have Redwood Industries come to a town board meeting, so there is a whole host of problems that could arise from that. Sheriff Joe McGill. “This is part of the requirement under the state statute for us to present to you our proposed spending plan that will come out of the public safety sales tax budget. The public safety sales tax is a separate fund from the general fund and that is items that can be purchased for law enforcement and fire department. The amended plan from fiscal year 2025, if you'd like to go through the whole thing or I can just give you totals or however you'd like to do it. I have it up on the screen for everybody to look at too.

Initially, what we had approved was items one through six. Item one is for GTAC.

So that you're aware, Round Mountain's portion of the total cost of these items is based on your population, which as of last count was 803 people, being 1.54% of Nye County's total population So then we break down, you pay 1.54% of the total cost of each of these items.

So, the first item was body cameras and vehicle cameras. That Round Mountain portion was \$924. Lens Lock is a new body cam and vehicle cameras that we purchased.

The reason was our service contract was out with GTAC. We needed new equipment, and we looked around and Lens Lock was the vendor that we chose. So, the annual cost for year two of the five-year contract, the Round Mountain total was \$5,294.50. Cradle points are the modems that run the computers in our cars.

The cradle points were approved in fiscal year 2017 spending plan. And the 25 Round Mountain portion was \$231. Verizon is the mobile cell phone system that we use to operate.

That was approved in the fiscal year 2017 spending plan. And in the 25th year, the Round Mountain portion was \$924. ECR, which was approved in the fiscal year 2017 spending plan, that is fingerprint machines that we use in Pahrump and Tonopah.

And the 25 Round Mountain portion of that was \$61.60. CPI Guardian, that is a big vacuum sealer machine that we put prisoners' clothes and personal effects in. That was approved in fiscal year 21 spending plan. And the 25-year cost for the Round Mountain portion was \$77, (12:36) for a total of \$7,512.10. Those items were approved in the fiscal year 2025.”

Lisa Davila, D-A-V-I-L-A. - Sheriff, how many patrols do we have currently served this area?

Haley Kinzer, K-I-N-Z-E-R.

“I'm a bartender out here, and I worked the night shift. And I had a disgruntled customer, and it took someone from Tonopah three hours to get to me. And I was by myself, in a bar, with no cop out here.

And so, what I think is being stated is we need someone. You're in Round Mountain tonight, and if you get a call, then you come back to Tonopah. You're going to come right back to Round Mountain and sit, right? Is that what we're getting at? So, I'm telling you, as a female, and being out here by myself, what if something were to happen to me? There's no one out here to protect me.

And three hours is ridiculous. Three hours. It took three hours.

Like the memo said, you can have, under NRS 241021, you can have just a public comment at the beginning and a public comment at the end.

That is all-inclusive for items on or off the agenda. It's not as clean that way. Should there ever be an open meeting law complaint, it's always recommended to have public comments after any action item.

And that's the minimum standard. You can always have public comments. There's no such thing as not enough public comment.

So, it's purely at the pleasure of the board how the board wants to structure this, as long as it's compliant with NRS 241021. And then I can draft the future agenda so the language is appropriate, and the board, I can go through with the board's direction.

10. Discussion, deliberation, and possible decision regarding Corey Gourd from Afterhours Security in attendance to discuss concerns or fire house internet, security monitoring, contract and billing. (For possible action)

Jim Swigart- So, I want to thank Corey for coming in.

“So, the storage is the important part. And being able to go back and review footage and find out what happened and get to the bottom of investigations and get to the bottom of it. And those are triggered by a security alarm or how does that work? So, like, they can be.”

Haley Kinzer, KINZR.

“We don't have cameras and we're having input. Like what? I'm confused. We have cameras everywhere.

Okay, so what do we need this guy for? We can't look at cameras. (52:00) I'm honestly asking. (52:01) He has a maintenance contract for us. (52:05) So any time a camera goes down and stuff, you're coming.

(51:28) That's if you have an intrusion alarm system or even access control (51:33) because they all kind of work together. (51:36) But just a straight surveillance system or cameras, (51:40) it's kind of like, hey, this is missing. (51:42) I don't know what's going on.”

Corey- “Yes, this isn't a stand-alone residential system. (52:12) This is a big enterprise, like, on a network infrastructure system. (52:17) Okay, who's been doing this the whole time, and you haven't been here? (52:19) I've been doing it.”

11. Discussion, deliberation and possible decision regarding Maintenance auctions item list(For public Comment). (For possible action)

I'm Josh Yost, maintenance supervisor, YOST.

(1:21:21) I got my list together. (1:21:23) I think you guys all got a copy of it. (1:21:25) I'm just here to get you guys approval for the auction (1:21:28) and maybe talk about some prices.

(1:21:31) The first one we got is the old grader. (1:21:35) We just got that new one today. (1:21:37) It had no purpose for two graders at all.

(1:21:42) I did a little digging on what those go for. (1:21:46) We're talking \$10,000 to \$15,000ish. (1:21:49) It's in pretty good shape.

(1:21:51) It's a little bigger than the throw minimum on it at, like, \$12,000. (1:22:00) The next one is the state bed truck. (1:22:03) I think we should keep it.

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(1:22:06) In light of the things that we're looking to do, (1:22:10) it's going to be needed for a lot of other things. (1:22:16) So my personal opinion is that that truck we keep. (1:22:20) Okay.

(1:22:20) I think he's referring to if we do the golf course, (1:22:24) we're going to need something that can carry pallets and stuff (1:22:27) and things like that. (1:22:30) Okay, I understand that. (1:22:33) That specific truck has been sitting there since I started here.

(1:22:37) We don't have the manpower to work on it, (1:22:39) and I don't have the manpower that can run it. (1:22:42) What year is it and how many miles? (1:22:46) I'm sorry? (1:22:46) I was asking Josh a question. (1:22:49) He's saying he doesn't have the manpower to do it and what else? (1:22:53) I don't have the skill level underneath me to run that thing.

(1:22:57) And it's sat there since he started. (1:22:59) The truck. (1:22:59) And it's sat there since we started.

(1:23:01) The state bed is what he's talking about. (1:23:03) We'll run it. (1:23:07) I mean, it's not.

(1:23:12) There's nothing. (1:23:14) There's no requirement for a CEO. (1:23:16) No, not at all.

(1:23:18) So you can run it with just a regular license? (1:23:21) No, I understand that. (1:23:23) What I'm saying is I have a very, very green, young crew (1:23:26) that has not ran anything in their lives. (1:23:30) I personally, I agree with what you're saying here, (1:23:32) but in the bigger aspect of everything, I don't see us having a purpose for that.

(1:23:36) We can keep it. (1:23:37) That's fine. (1:23:42) Next one's Dodge Neon.

(1:23:44) It's sitting out by the sewer ponds. (1:23:45) It used to be a janitor car. (1:23:48) We got it up and running a couple months ago.

(1:23:50) It sat in the yard for a week and it moved right back to the sewer ponds. (1:23:55) We have a little white Ford with the toolbox on the back and the headache rack. (1:24:01) It's being decommissioned for high mileage.

(1:24:06) We'll throw it in the auction and see if we get any money for it, in my opinion. (1:24:09) There's a big, huge pressure washer trailer out by the sewer ponds that we will not use. (1:24:16) We have pressure washers on both sets of our back trailers.

(1:24:21) We have a welding trailer. (1:24:22) We already took the welder off. (1:24:24) The only one we have to take off now is the cabinet for the bottles.

(1:24:28) We can sell that trailer. (1:24:30) We have a ditch witch in the yard, a Honda tractor in the yard. (1:24:37) We have a tire machine and balancer in the shop.

(1:24:42) They're a smaller set. (1:24:43) We have a bigger set in the loop bay. (1:24:45) So those tire machines never get touched.

(1:24:48) We got an 8 by 10 trailer. (1:24:51) It's floating around out back. (1:24:53) It never gets touched.

(1:24:55) We got two four-wheelers. (1:24:57) Those are still the fire departments. (1:25:01) And you're still waiting on stuff for metals, aren't you? (1:25:04) So I know once upon a time ago, before Heidi left, (1:25:08) she was looking into where those are tied to (1:25:13) because we believe those were about to go along with grant money.

(1:25:17) And the ball kind of got dropped, and I have no idea where she was looking for any of that stuff. (1:25:24) I would have no idea where to start, but I can certainly try my best. (1:25:29) Well, one of the things on one of those four-wheelers that I was thinking about myself was that (1:25:36) use-wise is they could use it to drag the fields down into baseball fields (1:25:42) instead of trying to use a golf cart.

(1:25:48) So one of those four-wheelers doesn't run at all. (1:25:52) The other one runs somewhat. (1:25:56) I agree that we could use them.

(1:25:58) Right now, this list was strictly clutter. (1:26:02) Everything we haven't touched since I've been here, I put on this list. (1:26:06) The only other thing I got on the list is a hand auger.

(1:26:09) We have three hand augers sitting in the comics. (1:26:13) I don't need three hand augers. (1:26:15) I have an auger for the backhoe, I got an auger for the tool cap, (1:26:18) and I think two would suffice in the comics.

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(1:26:30) No, I think I would just take the one item off that was in question, (1:26:34) and we'll figure that out later. (1:26:35) Maybe it'll go in the next auction. (1:26:37) The stake bid? (1:26:39) The stake bid and the four-wheelers are the two things that we need to take off.

(1:26:44) You guys need to decide what kind of auction you want. (1:26:46) Do you want a silent auction or a sealed bid? (1:26:49) I would like to see a sealed bid, personally. (1:26:54) I agree.

(1:26:56) Public comment? (1:26:57) How will you run your public notice for the auction, Jim? (1:27:03) We... (1:27:05) Michelle, are you still there? (1:27:09) We have to post it. (1:27:12) We're going to put the items out where everybody can view it. (1:27:14) I would think, and I'm not guessing, you know, (1:27:18) I'm totally guessing, I'm not knowing for sure, (1:27:20) but I would imagine it would probably be similar to the open meeting law, (1:27:24) but that that is definitely something that we could talk to Michelle about (1:27:29) so that we're in compliance, because it is an auction, (1:27:32) and have it state, because I know you have to have it in the papers, I think.

(1:27:38) Well, that was part of the problem last time, Jim. (1:27:39) Well, I think in the papers it has to be for a specific time frame, (1:27:43) unlike the meeting laws. (1:27:46) 100%.

(1:27:46) Yeah, so if we are to, I think it's two, is it two weeks? (1:27:51) I think it's 30 days. (1:27:52) Oh, is it 30 days? (1:27:53) I don't remember the last one. (1:27:53) I don't know.

(1:27:54) I don't remember the time frame. (1:27:55) But I do know that it has to be in the paper (1:27:57) for a specific amount of time where the open meeting law is not that, (1:28:02) so we could definitely get clarification (1:28:03) to make sure we're following it, (1:28:05) and actually put it as well into the Valley View (1:28:10) and things like that for, you know, more local. (1:28:14) You can post it down at the community center.

(1:28:16) Yeah, but that's something that we could actually do flyers (1:28:19) and everything too. (1:28:21) Yeah, I was just wanting to be clear, (1:28:22) because there was controversy at one time (1:28:24) about how it was listed, the opportunity to view the different items, (1:28:28) so I was just wondering. (1:28:29) Yeah, we'll have everything.

(1:28:31) Everything's going to be over here in one spot. (1:28:33) Yep. (1:28:34) I will get with Michelle.

(1:28:36) I would definitely get clarification from her. (1:28:39) I think we should table this. (1:28:41) I am on the line.

(1:28:43) Okay. (1:28:45) Have you heard all that, Michelle? (1:28:48) I did. (1:28:50) I will have to look into it

Lacey Baker, B A K E R , from the Recreation Department. (1:29:00) I had a question.

(1:29:01) The Rec Department was wondering if we could add, (1:29:04) I'm sure you've all seen it, that extremely large pumpkin bounce house. (1:29:09) We were hoping that we can put that in the auction (1:29:11) and then hopefully get something more universal that we can use for all the holidays (1:29:16) and it's not just a huge giant pumpkin. (1:29:19) On top of that, it's extremely hard to move. (1:29:21) We usually have to bring a backhoe out every single time. (1:29:24) So if I could find something that was just a little easier to bring out (1:29:28) and pack up, we would really appreciate it. (1:29:31) So I think that if we ask all the departments for anything (1:29:37) and everything that they.

13. Discussion, deliberation and possible decision regarding the Town of Round Mountain employee vehicle usage. (For possible action)

Employees are prohibited from transporting family members (1:34:27) in a town vehicle unless specifically authorized to do so (1:34:30) by their supervisor or manager. (1:34:37) My opinion on this is very simple. (1:34:39) Our vehicle policy should be vehicles are only used for the town (1:34:43) and brown mountain for the purpose of that.

(1:34:46) They're not taken home. (1:34:48) They're not going to be driven all over the place. (1:34:50) It doesn't need to happen.

(1:34:52) They can come here, pick up the vehicle, go do what they got to do. (1:34:56) As far as transporting their kids or anything else, that's a no-no. (1:35:02) It cannot happen.

(1:35:04) I believe we hang ourselves out in a severe position of liability (1:35:11) allowing that. (1:35:13) Even if it's authorized to do so by a supervisor or manager, (1:35:18) our insurance does not cover that. (1:35:23) The only one that covers it is the van, right? (1:35:26) The van.

(1:35:27) It's specifically designated as a means of transport for the community. Lisa Davila, D-A-V-I-L-A. (1:35:36) I also believe that whoever is renting the van (1:35:39) must show proof of insurance there.

(1:35:45) So it's not that the town is actually covering it. (1:35:47) Whoever the renting party is is actually covering that expense. (1:35:52) Lacey, can you confirm that? (1:35:53) Yes, that is true.

(1:35:54) Even with that, I wouldn't want anybody to have any legalities (1:36:02) to come back on the town for anything. (1:36:05) Even though our policy states unless specifically authorized to do so, no. (1:36:12) Janet, that kind of surprises me seeing that.

(1:36:14) I haven't witnessed that. (1:36:16) It's because of the fact that there was, in the past, (1:36:19) that there's been some controversy again regarding this, (1:36:21) that town money was being used in terms of gas and the mileage on the vehicles (1:36:27) and then having to replace it. (1:36:28) That was a really, really big to-do.

(1:36:30) Really big thing. (1:36:31) It's what we contended with back when I was on the board. (1:36:34) So this is not new, so I'm surprised that's back in there saying (1:36:37) that that will be allowed.

(1:36:39) I take it back. (1:36:40) I don't think that it is allowed. (1:36:42) We even looked back at my county.

(1:36:44) Was it my county? (1:36:45) Yeah. (1:36:48) No matter what position you're in, (1:36:50) you should not be taking vehicles home. (1:36:53) No, and Mr. Westerlund, you know, (1:36:57) gave an e-mail that he does allow his on-call person.

(1:37:03) Yeah. (1:37:03) But we are smaller, and I don't see why we need to allow that to go home. (1:37:17) Yeah, I don't think vehicles need to go home.

(1:37:22) Does that include town manager or no? (1:37:26) Yes. (1:37:27) He's an employee. (1:37:29) I think it is.

(1:37:30) I think it is cognitive. (1:37:32) It's not in his contract. (1:37:38) Oh, I feel this way.

(1:37:39) I mean, the department heads that we have, right, (1:37:46) and you look at department heads at the mine, okay, (1:37:50) most of them have their own vehicle, and especially Josh. (1:37:53) So if you wanted to go that route, (1:37:55) then that's included in their salary, and they can be taxed on that. (1:37:58) If you want to do that, then by all means.

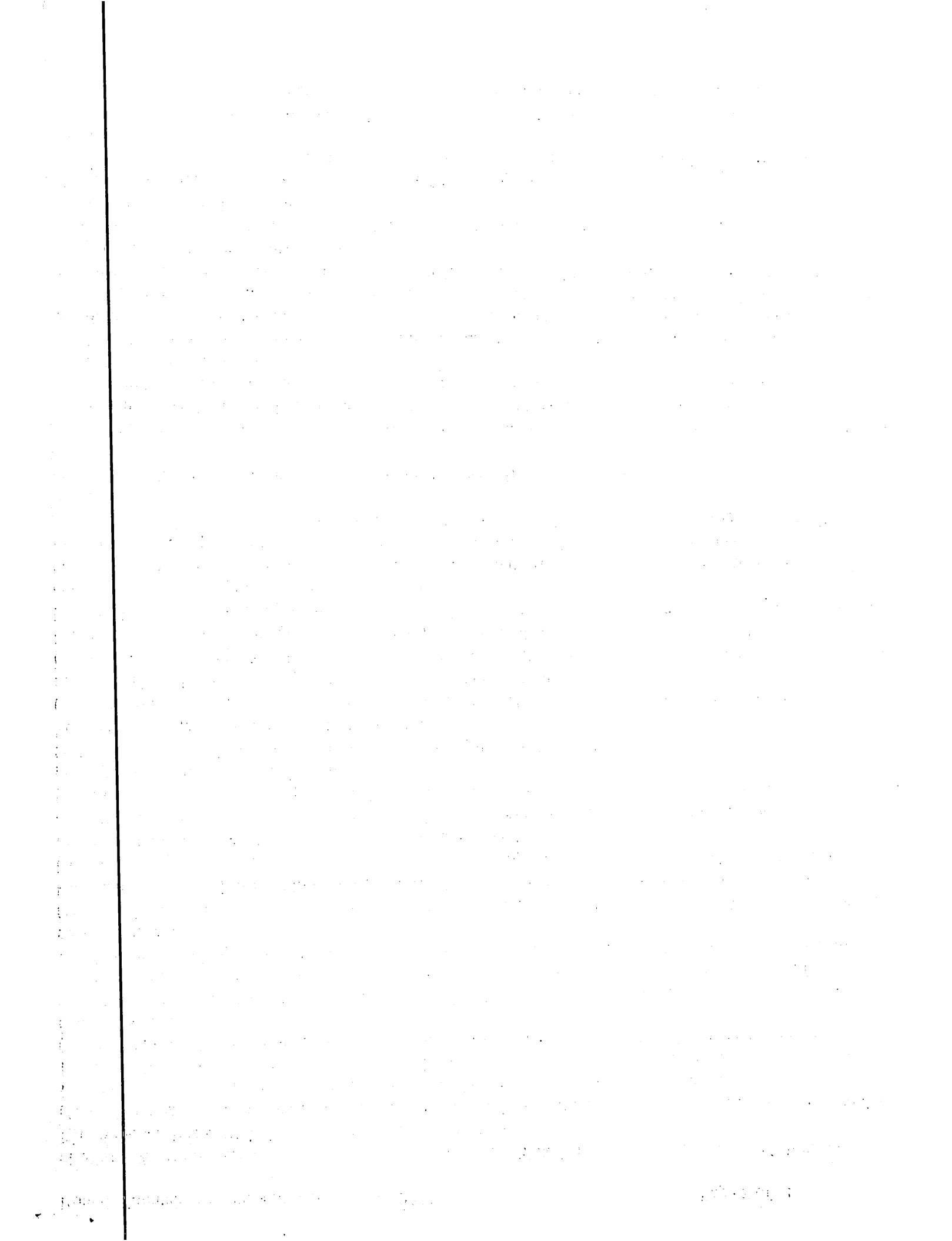
